## What's the Buzz? THE BEE HIVE IS REVIVED

The beloved store that grew out of a by-gone era more than a century ago is reinventing itself. Jacqueline Foster Ashley and her daughter, Katie Beth Johnson, are the new owners of the Bee Hive. The name is the same and the location is still at 510 Main Street in Anderson.

Jacqueline and Katie Beth have transformed the Bee Hive into an elegant venue for weddings, showers, receptions, as well as informal gatherings such as a champagne brunch with mimosas.

But wait, there's more. The upstairs will feature women's and children's clothing, jewelry, china and specialty items for the kitchen. Antiques, lamps, and Christmas decorations will also be a part of the Bee Hive repertoire.

The original Bee Hive was the brain child of G.H. Bailes. Bailes was an entrepreneur who could spot a mutually beneficial opportunity for self and customer alike. The Bee Hive was in business in Anderson as early as 1902, as shown in the Bee Hive ads that ran in the Intelligencier newspaper of that year.

The Bee Hive was located in two different downtown locations in Anderson, prior to the current site at 510 Main Street. And if you needed something, Bailes could find it. Among the items sold at the Bee Hive at the turn of the 20th century were octagon-shaped soaps, and "kangaroo shoes." Kangaroo shoes? Yes! Not shoes for kangaroos, but shoes made from kangaroo hide.

## Deep secrets: Self-injury and self-harm behavior

Self-injury and self-harm behaviors are more common than people understand — whether it is scratching, pinching, cutting, carving, burning, hair-pulling, or behaviors that interfere with the healing process. Recent research also suggests that 1 in 6 people engage in self-harm or non-suicidal self-injury behavior at one point in their lifetime — often beginning between the ages of 12-14. It should also be noted that contrary to what outsiders may perceive, the majority of individuals engaging in such behaviors do not want to die or take his/her life.

This behavior often manifests as a coping mechanism and usually falls into one of the following categories:

1. Self-harm and physical sensations often provide an emotional release and create a temporary moment of calm or relief. Unfortunately, this is one reason cutting and other non-suicidal behaviors are reinforcing and ultimately

addictive. Specifically, the sensations are often reported to provide a “release” and “escape” of negative affect. In turn, negative events may lead to a “craving” or “need” to engage in such behaviors.

2. Individuals often report in my office that cutting makes them feel “more alive” and takes away feelings of being numb. Often, individuals with trauma associate self-harm with taking “control” of pain and his/her body.

3. When emotions are not accepted at home or in public settings, self-injury and self-harm behaviors serve as an outlet for emotional pain. Instead of setting themselves up to be invalidated, cutting may become an “acceptable” way to feel the pain.

4. Self-harm and self-injury may be used as a punishment for individuals who are perfectionistic or have extremely high self-expectations. The self-criticism or disappointment and dissatisfaction leads to needing to “do something” to make amends for a mistake. For example, carving “stupid” or “failure” into his/her bodies.

Reducing and ultimately stopping this behavior often requires professional help where individuals can learn more positive coping tools and supports. Likewise, finding ways to engage in the present moment, silencing the inner critic, and letting go of shame. In the meantime, finding healthier and less harmful ways to express emotions, such as using red paint and markers on the body or holding an ice cube in the palm of the hand can provide similar sensations and relief without actual damage.

Over the years, patrons of the Bee Hive were enamored with the trinkets, fabrics, and unique gifts that they discovered. Sue Belk’s fondest memories were of the upstairs sewing room with white walls, black floors, and sunlight streaming through the windows. “Four women, including my grandmother, sewed, steamed, and ironed fabulous cotton and linen fabrics. The air was always heavy with the smell of freshly brewed coffee. Gossip flowed freely.”

Ann Johnson Rabon shared, “I loved to shop there for gifts. They wrapped them for you and made a beautiful bow.”

Andy Sands loved the Bee Hive and Ms Frances. Andy said, “And some years before that, my mother loved shopping at George Bailes’ interior design shop, ‘The Hamilton House.’

Graeme McGregor Heintz recalls that Frances Johnson was ‘a force of nature.’ “I loved just going and hanging out with her and helping her wrap gifts with heavy wallpaper. She was funny, eccentric and wonderful. I started my antique teacup collection from Frances, also antique prints. She had a million clocks because “her brother, Dr. Charles Bailes, collected clocks. It’s what he gave me for a wedding present, still treasured in my home.”

Lisa Gallant Fouché loved going to the Bee Hive in cold weather to find

Christmas presents. “Frances would always have the iron stove on in the middle room and it would be so cozy. I loved the tiny room behind it that had all the small gifts. But all the rooms — front, lower, and on the side — were filled with great gifts.”

Jimmy Staggs shared, “My sister and I loved to ramble around in there in the 1970’s”

Linda Byce and her sister loved to meander around in the store. “I bought my favorite, tiny doll there. I had it for many years.”

Dianne Coker said, “The Bee Hive had gifts for all occasions — weddings, graduation, birthdays and especially Christmas ... There would be a different tree in each room with the most whimsical decorations. You could also get South Carolina themed gifts, and antiques galore. I loved the Bee Hive! My friend Trudy Johnson and her mom, Frances Johnson, were owners. Fond memories shopping there.”

A grand reopening of The Bee Hive will be held Tuesday, October 23, from 5-8 p.m.

# Yes, a woman's oral health can change throughout life

Let me start by reminding everyone this is Women's Breast Cancer Awareness month, an important annual effort to increase public awareness of this devastating illness. The sobering fact is approximately 250,000 women in the US will be diagnosed with breast cancer — this year. More than 40,500 will die.

There is no sure way to prevent breast cancer. But there are things you can do that might lower your risk. Medical research has linked some forms of breast cancer to alcohol consumption, obesity and lack of exercise. The American Cancer Society recommends maintaining a healthy weight throughout life by balancing your food intake with physical activity. And of course, women should take advantage of today's better screening that can lead to early detection.

Ladies do not ignore this.

**Further, I want to take this opportunity to emphasize that women also have unique oral health**

**care challenges throughout their lives.**

My female patients will often ask, "Do my oral health needs change as I age? If so how?" Due to normal hormonal

fluctuations, women's oral health needs change at different stages throughout life, i.e. puberty, pregnancy. Moreover, medical research has shown there is a relationship between cyclical changes over the course of a woman's life and the presence of gum (periodontal) disease — even potentially accelerating the destruction this can cause to teeth and gums.

Here are oral health symptoms women should watch for at key life stages:

**Puberty.** An increased level of sex hormones may cause increased blood circulation to the gums resulting in mouth and gum tissue sensitivity and

irritation from food particles and plaque.

**Pregnancy.** Gums may become swollen, turn red and feel tender. Note: pregnant women diagnosed with periodontal (gum) disease are more likely to have pre-term, low birth weight babies.

**Menopause and post-menopause.** Changes and discomfort in the mouth can occur, including dry mouth, pain and burning sensations in the gum tissue, and altered taste.

Of course, not every woman is affected in the same way during these stages. However, studies reveal that approximately 23 percent of women ages 30 to 54 have periodontitis, the advanced stage of periodontal disease with active destruction of gum tissues. For women ages 55 to 90 it jumps to 44 percent. Periodontal disease is called a "silent" disease. Many women do not realize they have it. It's been linked to serious health conditions including diabetes and arthritis.

Women's oral health is indeed unique.

# October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month

It's October, which means it's Breast Cancer Awareness Month and why you can see splashes of pink everywhere. There are fundraisers, speaking events, marathons and pink ribbons throughout the community. Even celebrities don their pink gear to bring awareness to this special time of year.

But despite the country dedicating the month of October to breast cancer awareness, only 65 percent of women aged 40 and over have had a mammogram in the last two years.

"A mammogram is the best way to detect cancer early," said Dr. Michelle Tucker of AnMed Health OB/GYN Associates. "Mammograms are specialized X-rays of the breast tissue. A radiologist then tries to interpret if all of the tissue in the breast appears normal, or if there are some areas — which often are otherwise undetectable — that appear suspicious."

If a radiologist sees an abnormality, they then assess how likely an abnormal

area is to be cancerous and then rank that likeliness on a scale. Depending on the severity of the ranking, they could recommend further screenings or treatment options.

According to the National Cancer Institute, more than 266,000 women in the United States will be diagnosed with breast cancer and some 40,000 will die of the disease in 2018. Breast cancer is the second most common kind of cancer in women. And three out of four women diagnosed with breast cancer do not have a family history of the disease.

The general recommendation is that women start having annual mammograms at age 40. Women who are at a higher risk, such as those who have had family members develop breast cancer, should talk to their doctor about how often and when to have a mammogram.

Dr. Tucker said early diagnosis through mammography can save lives.

"When you diagnose the cancer early,

that means the treatment is limited and not very invasive," she said. "That means the cost of treatment is less, plus the patient's prognosis is better."

Scheduling a mammogram appointment is easy and the procedure can usually be completed in the timespan of an afternoon lunch break. No prep is needed other than remembering not to wear any deodorant so as to prevent distorted images. Once a woman has a mammogram, most facilities schedule an annual follow-up and will call to remind her of her appointment.

Dr. Tucker said, "So put it on your calendar. Remind your friends. Harass your sisters. Gently encourage your mother. Mammograms save lives. Breast cancer can be detected early. We may not yet be able to prevent breast cancer, but by having consistent mammograms, we have a fighting chance."

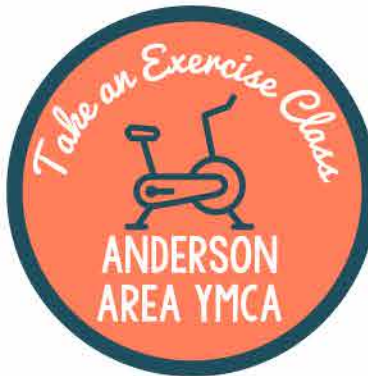

# T.L. HANNA YELLOW JACKETS

T.L. Hanna is rolling right along in the quest for the 5 AAAAA championship and a berth in the upcoming playoffs. Hanna, 8-0 overall and 5-0 in region play, saw their last two games in the likes of the Easley Greenwave and the Wade Hampton Generals both resulting in wins for the Yellow Jackets, 41-0 and 60-22, respectively.

Hanna as a team is rushing 262.1 yards per game on average. #23 Isaiah Norris leads with 395 yards on 43 attempts, averaging 9.2 yards per carry. He is followed by #9 Jay Lagroon with 332 yards, and #6 Zacch Pickens with 331 yards.

In the passing department, #1 Alex Meredith has 20 completions on 27 attempts for 484 yards and 7 touchdowns. #14 Logan Milford is sitting at 108 yards, 5 completions on 9 attempts and 2 touchdowns.

The Jackets receiving corps has seen Norris leading in catches with 10 catches for 301 yards, an average of 30.1 yards per game. Lagroon has 131 yards of receiving on 6 catches for an average of 21.8 yards per catch. Hanna as a team has 600 yards of receiving on 26 catches for an average of 75 yards per game.

Defensively, Hanna as a team has recorded 394 tackles for the year. #44 Cameron Chandler leads with 44 total tackles, 8 tackles for loss. The versatile Pickens has 42 tackles total and 9 tackles for loss, while Lagroon has 36 tackles and 4 tackles for loss.

Interceptions are led by #20 Ja'nike Truesdale with 3, followed by #5 Jaheim Handy and Lagroon, with two each. As a team, the Jackets have 10 total interceptions for a total of 127 yards.

Pickens and Norris both lead with 60 points scored this season, while Lagroon has 30 points, and #3 J.J. Hudson and #22 Jaydon McKinney each have scored 24 points.

Hanna's next opponent will be the last home contest of the season versus Laurens on Friday, October 19 at 7:30 p.m. The season finale will be an away game versus Woodmont on Friday, October 26.



# WESTSIDE RAMS

The Westside Rams are 3-5 overall with a region standing of 3-2 so far this season. With hopes of keeping the playoffs alive, the team is preparing to play Greenwood this Friday, Oct. 19, at 7:30 p.m.

So far, Westside's total yards gained has the Rams with 2,866 yards of offense. Passing yards equal 1,674, which gives them an average of 209.25 yards passing per game and 15 touchdowns.

Leading the Rams in passing is quarterback #17 Elijah Harper, with 1,093 yards on 54 completions for a percentage of 42.86 and 10 touchdowns. #2 junior Shedrick Smith is backing up Harper with 452 passing yards on 43 completions for a percentage of 56.58 and 3 touchdowns, which makes next year look good for the quarterback position.

Among the top offensive players is #1 Traye Carson, who brought in 34 of those passes for a total of 588 yards and 5 touchdowns. With 24 receptions, #23 Paul Johnson has 275 yards and 2 touchdowns. Smith also has 261 yards on 11 catches with 3 touchdowns.

As a team rushing this year, the Rams have totaled 1,192 yards and 16 touchdowns. Showing the way on the leaderboard is Johnson, who has 505 yards of runs on 99 carries for an average of 5.10 yards per carry and 9 touchdowns. Another very versatile Ram is Smith, with 198 yards of rushing on 30 attempts and 1 rushing touchdown for an average of 6.60 yards per carry. #8 C.J. Plantin is also one of the leading receivers.

Showing the way for the defense is #45 Ty Danzy with 11 tackles, 1 sack and 4 tackles for loss. #12 Kiante Miller and #44 Nasir Evans are tied with 10 tackles each. #11 Tim Johnson leads the team with 2 interceptions while the team has a total of 9 interceptions.

Other leaders on defense include #78 Xvaion Glenn, #60 Asia Gaines and #46 Devante Gambrell.

After their trip to Greenwood, the Rams will host Wade Hampton in a region matchup to hopefully keep their playoff aspirations alive for 2018.



# BELTON-HONEA PATH BEARS

The BHP Bears this season are 6-2 overall and 2-1 in region play so far, with two regular season games left to play.

As a team, the Bears are rushing 108 yards per game, led by #5 Jaquez Dixon with 365 yards on 63 attempts for an average per game of 60.8 and 18 points scored. Also in the rushing department, #20 Jeremiah Johnson has tallied 216 yards on 36 attempts, averaging 6 yards per carry.

In passing, the Bears are led by #18 Cameron Bratcher with an outstanding 1,332 yards on 81 completions for 135 attempts and 13 touchdowns. Receiving in the Bears' den this season is #3 Xavier Nance with a whopping 448 yards for an average of 13.6 yards per catch. Following behind Nance is #4 Jacob Howard with a total of 334 yards on 13 catches, a nice average of 25.7 per catch.

Defensively, the Bears are averaging 41.9 tackles per game with 9 sacks and 9 interceptions for the year. Leading the Bears defense in tackles is #6 Joseph Sloan IV, with a total of 53 tackles and 5 tackles for loss. #40 Devan Bolt has made 30 tackles and 4 tackles for loss, while #21 Brylan Oliver and #23 Wes Newton are tied with 22 tackles each, with Newton having 2 tackles for loss.

Sloan, #55 Cadavius Gary, and #65 Tyshiek Galloway are all tied with two sacks each for the defense.

The Bears have a total of 4 interceptions this season, with 1 each for #7 Semaj Groves, #10 Antareus Pressley, #23 Wes Newton and #40 Devan Bolt.

Belton-Honea Path's previous two games resulted in wins against Palmetto, 41-24, and Pickens, 27-10.

The BHP Bears will host a region game versus Wren on Friday, October 19 at 7:30 p.m. in hopes of keeping their playoff

hopes alive. Following the Wren game, the team will travel to Pickens County to face Daniel in a region contest, the last of the regular season.

# PENDLETON BULLDOGS

The Pendleton Bulldogs are carrying a 6-2 overall record with a 3-0 region record so far this season with 2 regular season games left to play.

This season the Bulldogs have scored 34 touchdowns on 189.4 yards rushing per game and 203.4 yards receiving per game. While the defense is providing 72.1 tackles, 17 sacks and 3 interceptions per game.

Leading in passing for the "Dogs" is #7 Jamal Blakley with 1,395 total yards passing, with 92 completions on 154 attempts for a percentage of .597 and 16 touchdown passes with only 4 interceptions. As a team for the season the Bulldogs have 1,437 yards of passing.

In rushing, the team has 1,326 yards for the season. Leading the team is Blakley with 477 yards on 52 attempts for a 9.2 yard per carry average. Just behind is #4 Jason Wright-Mann with 461 yards total for an average of 7.8 yards per carry. #21 Amir Dendy has contributed 257 yards on 48 carries for an average of 5.4 yards per carry.

Sack leaders for the Bulldogs are #32 Antwin Jackson with 6 sacks, Stuetgen with 4 sacks, and Bell with 3 sacks. As a team, Pendleton has a total of 17 sacks for the year.

When it comes to interceptions, #6 Tamyus Davis has 2 and #5 Braxton Spado has 1.

During the previous two games, the Bulldogs won 51-7 against Powdersville and 45-7 against Crescent High.

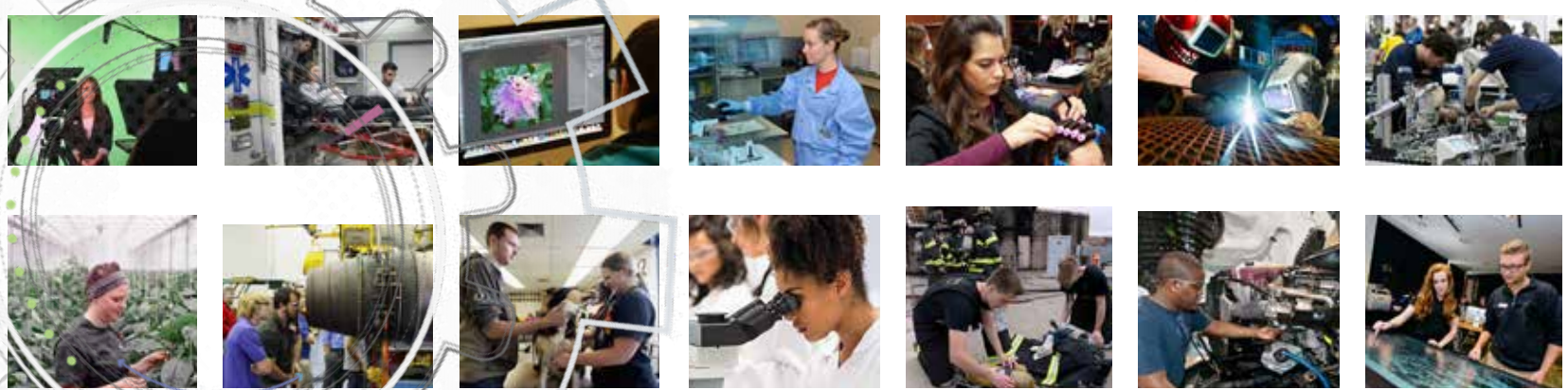

# In search of the perfect peonies

These days in the garden, there is anticipation of things to come.

Last fall, a group of gardeners toured David Culp's garden, Brandywine Cottage, in Downingtown, Pennsylvania. Culp is the author of "The Layered Garden." His place did not disappoint. It was beautiful and inspiring. As we came near the end of the tour, David was selling, and signing, his book. Yes, I fell for the marketing and bought a copy (autographed to Gardningirl, of course).

As I got near his patio, I was stopped in my tracks by a large patch of bright red seed pods under a huge hemlock tree. That red in deep shade was dazzling. Those of us staring at those beautiful pods gave up and asked David the name of the plant. It is woodland peony, (*Peony obovata*). In hindsight, I suppose the leaves should have told me it was a peony, but being dazzled by the pods, and not knowing of a shade peony, I was dumbfounded for a guess.

This set me on a mission to find

woodland peonies. I struck out but didn't give up and finally ended up on the waiting list with Peony Envy, a mail order source in Bernardsville, New Jersey. Peony Envy was a vendor at the Southeastern Flower Show in Atlanta so I was familiar with their peonies. I got the phone call last month that woodland peonies were available and ready to be shipped. Oh Happy Day!

The single white flower of woodland peony is sort of plain, with little or no fragrance. They're grown primarily for the seedpods. A patch has been started under the shade of a red maple tree. The garden slightly slopes down so this will meet their requirement of well-drained soil. Hopefully the plants will reseed and make a showy patch. Maybe everything

will be timed right and the maple tree will be in full fall splendor as the seed pods show off too.

My favorite mail order for peonies is Adleman Peony in Salem Oregon. I've ordered from them several times and have been pleased with their plants. They provided a peony as a door prize for a recent class I was teaching at Anderson University. I've also read about fernleaf peonies (*Paeonia tenuifolia*) but have never seen one in real life. Adelman offered fernleaf so I couldn't resist getting one of these too. The foliage is quite different

from regular herbaceous peonies, looking lacy and more delicate. The flowers are single red. This type is not a full shade peony like woodland but supposedly will tolerate more shade than our normal types. This new one was planted just past the shade of the maple tree. Hopefully it will do well in the amount of sun it is in for now. That way, if it's in too much sun, it should become happier as the tree grows. We'll see.

He cajoled us of the dire need to reach out to those less fortunate. That there are golden opportunities for success and volunteering to a large segment of our town. He is renovating a house on G Street to live in and be close to those he serves. The most expensive is \$29,999, his is \$9,350. Of the 28 houses on G Street, 26 are rentals, no government loans are available, hence the preponderance of rentals.

An MBA graduate of Indiana Wesleyan University he pivoted

away from the riches of the corporate work to live among and work with the down and out. The story began in Colorado in 2008 when Matt Beasley invited him to Anderson to talk about a need in Anderson to provide and augment some needs that were not being met. Notwithstanding, the first work being done by the likes of A.I.M. United Way etc, there remains a niche that was not being reached.

Returning to Indiana he sold or gave away all of his earthy belongings and returned to Anderson to follow in his dad's footsteps who has worked in the nonprofit mission field for 40 years.

As he related to our First

Presbyterian Sunday School Class, there are 1,250 families who exist on poverty level income of \$10,000 or less. An elderly woman must use three hours to ride the bus to and from her grocery shopping. There are others who must forgo second and third shift jobs because of lack of transportation.

The LOT Project is located at 302 W. Market Street, over 800 volunteers a year provide food, clothes and shoes to perhaps 125 "friends of the street."

"Shoes are a top priority," said Andy, "because our friends walk everywhere they go". In addition to life's basic needs the staff and volunteers seek to simply provide love and relationships

which many of the friends have never had.

The Project also has a coveted 211 Number (this is United Way's number) that is used for anyone who might need a friendly, loving voice to talk them through an immediate crisis in their life.

The nonprofit organizations of Anderson are doing splendid work, but there is a never-ending task. So if you've got a hankering to make a difference, go down and check out Andy and his cohorts. They're lighting the world; one candle at a time.

# Picking paint colors

It is so important to see the colors in the space over the span of a couple of days to see how they change. For instance, a blue that you love in one room could look purple in another. This is the most crucial step in the process and could save you a potential mistake and a few buckets of paint.

Although it can be intimidating, painting the rooms in your house can also be exciting. With these tips, I hope you can carefully select a color that you feel confident in. Painting is the fastest and easiest way to transform a space.

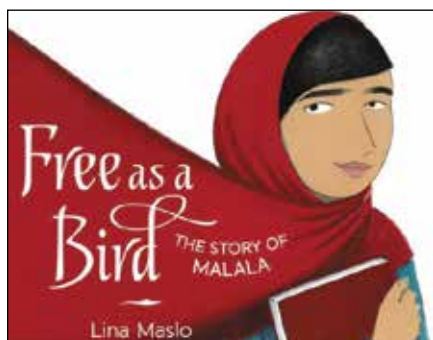
Born in the Ukraine, she moved to the United States at the age of 5 and lived in Florida. She earned a degree in Art from New College of Florida.

# How to choose 'just right' books for early readers and adolescents

Have you ever found yourself browsing around the bookstore or the library wondering, "How in the world can I choose the best book for my child?"

Trying to choose a "just right" book can indeed be a bit overwhelming. The good news is — whether you have a child just learning to read or perhaps an older child who doesn't even like to read — there is a perfect book out there for everyone. Here are a few helpful guidelines that will hopefully point you in the right direction.

**Early readers:** As your child enters the early grade school years, choosing a "just right" book can sometimes be a little more tricky. While children of this age need to be constantly challenged and encouraged to expand their reading ability and vocabulary, many picture books are still too difficult due to the advanced level of the text. Because not all children progress at the same rate, finding the right time to introduce more challenging books without causing the child to become discouraged and frustrated can be a daunting task. While it is very important that early readers are appropriately challenged, and have a lot of time to practice their reading skills, it's just as crucial that they feel successful and encouraged each step of the way. If the child feels defeated before he gets past the first page, reading will not become a fun activity which may result in the avoidance of reading altogether.

Here are a few tips for helping your child find the "just right" book for your early reader:

1. Choose a book you think they will enjoy.
2. Read the second page.
3. Hold up a finger for each word they are not sure of, or do not know.
4. If there are five or more words they did not know, they should choose an easier book.
5. Still think it may not be too difficult? Use the five finger rule on two more pages.

A few good suggestions for selecting a great book for your early reader: Look for Level 1 reading books that feature short sentences, big type, and

supportive picture clues. Often you will see repetition in sentence structure, as well as rhyming words, both of which help the reader predict and

decode new words. A few book ideas include: "Elephant and Piggie" books by Mo Willems, Dr. Seuss books such as "Go, Dog, Go", I Can Read books such as "Penny and her Marble", and Henry and Mr. Putter and Tabby books such as "Mr. Putter" and "Tabby Pour the Tea."

**Adolescents:** Although most older children are able to read fluently, it is very important that they continue to read and be read to. According to Scholastic's "Kids and Family Reading Report," only 17 percent of parents with kids, ages 9-11 spend time reading aloud to their children. The primary reason for this low percentage is that most parents mistakenly believe that children of these ages do not want to be read aloud to and additionally the parents do not believe it would provide the child with any real benefit. It is interesting to note however, that in a survey where children (ages 6-13) were asked if being read aloud to is an activity they either loved or liked a lot, 83 percent responded affirmatively. Research further shows, when adults take the time to read aloud to older children, the child is more likely to experience the joy of the story, to model the fluent reading style of the adult, and build a more enhanced vocabulary. The young reader is exposed to new authors, texts and genres. These build awareness and empathy, all of which results in increased long-term reading success and enjoyment. A few good book suggestions for this age group include: "The Penderwicks" by Jeanne Birdsall and Roald Dahl books such as "Charlie and the Chocolate Factory" and "The BFG."

There's the perfect book out there for everyone. It may take some time and effort to find something "just right," but when you do, the rewards are endless. Happy searching and happy reading!

J.M. Fields: Does that ring a bell to anyone? It should if you have been around Anderson for a while. J.M. Fields, as it looks in the picture above, was the anchor store for what is now Belvedere Plaza.

Around 1960, Belvedere Plaza came into prominence around Anderson as the "northern" most shopping center in town. At that time there was no Anderson Mall, which in a few years would be to the bottom left of the photo.

What are some of the stores that you remember from Belvedere? Fields, of course, and I can also remember S.S. Kregges, which after K-Mart opened later on, would all be incorporated. I'd bet a lot of you remember the wonderful smells coming out of the Belvedere Bakery too. I specifically remember those gingerbread men hanging on a clothesline in plastic bags behind the counter. I only got one or two as I recall when mom would go in the

shop for some delicious delicacy.

There was also the Barbershop, later on a branch of Gallant-Belk, would be right beside J.M. Fields. The Roller Rink, a skating rink that would later become The Landing, a seafood restaurant and later Duff's Smorgasbord, an all you can eat restaurant. I remember Dad telling me I embarrassed him going there with my two plates at a time!

And of course who could forget the most famous of residents at the Belvedere, Anderson's first McDonalds. "Mickey D's" sat just above the one there today, in the parking lot. In the spot where McDonalds is today was a Phillips 66 gas station named Ducworth and Lacy. Phillips 66 was a popular brand of gasoline at the time.

As a child, we lived just a few blocks from there and it was a wonderful place to go especially the toy department that J.M. Fields had for the kids.
